



A Pardon and a Public Disclosure

Presented by: Gleaves Whitney, MA

Few moments in American history were as bold as the choices made by Grand Rapids' own President Gerald R. Ford and First Lady Betty Ford. This course contextualizes President Ford's controversial pardon of Richard Nixon—on the 51st anniversary of the action—and Betty Ford's groundbreaking public disclosure of her struggles with alcoholism and substance abuse. These decisions redefined honesty and healing at the highest levels of public life, and their lasting legacy continues to reflect the character and values of the Fords' Midwestern roots.

Gleaves Whitney has been the executive director of the Gerald R. Ford Presidential Foundation since 2020. He earned an MA in history from the University of Michigan. A historian and former chief speechwriter for Governor John Engler, Whitney taught history and was the director of the Hauenstein Center for Presidential Studies at Grand Valley State University. He has edited and authored nineteen books.

Ranked Choice Voting: A Better Ballot for Michigan

Presented by: Sam Cale

Many voters are fed up with toxic politics and unresponsive, gridlocked government dominated by powerful special interests. Grassroots leaders across the country are organizing to solve one possible source of the problem—the voting system itself. Instead of picking just one candidate in a winner-take-all system, Ranked Choice Voting (RCV) may offer a viable solution. This course details challenges with the current voting system, and outlines how an ambitious initiative could change the ballot to enable a better voter experience, better campaigns, and ultimately, better government.

Sam Cale is a co-lead for the West Michigan Field Team of Rank MI Vote, a Michigan-based, volunteer-run, non-partisan, and non-profit organization dedicated to educating the public about Ranked Choice Voting. He has a BA in English from Michigan State University. Cale also serves as a precinct chair for elections in the City of Hastings.

Until recently, many thought of Christianity as a western phenomenon—the religion of Europe and the Americas. This perception began to change in the middle of the 20th century as wars and social unrest engulfed the Middle East. Western Christians were suddenly faced with the reality of a Christianity that did not look or think or worship in familiar western ways. This course challenges the social, ethnic, and religious biases that contributed to the disappearance of Christianity from the lands of its birth.

He currently directs post-doctoral research at Georgetown University and publishes on religion, history, and contemporary culture in print and online platforms.

A Walk Through History

Step back in time with two guided walking tours that bring Grand Rapids' rich past to life. From the gothic beauty of St. Mark's Episcopal Church to the twinkling charm of Heritage Hill, discover the limestone foundations of the city and step into the holiday spirit of a bygone era.

Sep 11, 2025: The Crown of Pearl Street: Inside St. Mark's Episcopal Church - The oldest public building in Grand Rapids, St. Mark's Episcopal Church was built in 1848, and preceded the city's incorporation. It is not only historic, but beautiful—inside and out. Join a walking narration of the history of the church, its architecture, special features, and prominent role in the growth of the city of Grand Rapids. After all, its political and cultural significance dubbed it the "Church of the Mayors" as well as the "Crown of Pearl Street".

NOTE: Limited free parking is available in the St. Mark's Lot. Directions to be provided. Additional street and paid parking available.

Dec 10, 2025: A Heritage Hill Victorian Christmas - Pretend it's December at the turn of the 20th century, during the reign of Queen Victoria. Grand Rapids dominated furniture production, and the owners of the impressive mansions in Heritage Hill are celebrating the holidays in style. In this evening tour, walk through this beautiful neighborhood, enjoy the festive lighting, meet the original owners of the historic homes, and share Victorian Christmas traditions.

Gilded Age Politics, Urban Bosses, and Progressive Reform

Presented by: Paul Murphy, PhD

The United States became a global industrial power during the late 19th century. Yet, economic progress brings turbulence, and great wealth breeds corruption. Political vote-buying and bribery were rampant; bosses ruled the cities; and conflict and poverty accompanied industrialization. In the Gilded Age, bosses promised benefits to their constituents in exchange for power. Their watchword was "loyalty"—not "fairness" or "justice." This course examines partisanship and political opportunism as well as the determined efforts of everyday Americans and reform-minded leaders to build a better, more democratic system during the Progressive Era. However, is the American commitment to democracy more tenuous than imagined? And was their new system really more just?



In this series, OLLI members select their favorite books for participants to read and discuss together. For the best discussion, participants are expected to read each selection before the session date.

Sep 17, 2025: The Boys in the Boat: Nine Americans and Their Epic Quest for Gold at the 1936 Berlin Olympics (2013) by Daniel James Brown – Set against the backdrop of the Great Depression and Nazi propaganda, *The Boys in the Boat* chronicles the inspiring true story of nine working-class American rowers and their journey of grit, teamwork, and determination on the world stage. (Watson)

Oct 15, 2025: Frankenstein; or, The Modern Prometheus (1818) by Mary Shelley - The classic and haunting story of Victor Frankenstein, a young scientist who creates a living being from dead body parts—only to be horrified by what he's made. As the creature seeks understanding and vengeance, the novel explores themes of ambition, isolation, and the consequences of playing God. (Kaiser)

Nov 12, 2025: *Persepolis: The Story of a Childhood* **(2003) by Marjane Satrapi -** This powerful graphic memoir by Marjane Satrapi recounts her childhood and early adulthood during and after the Islamic Revolution in Iran. Through bold illustrations and personal storytelling, Satrapi tackles identity, repression, and resistance as she comes of age in a time of political and cultural upheaval. (Knack)



McDaniel's Toy Cryptocurrency World

Presented by: Michael McDaniel, PhD

Have you ever wanted to explore the wild world of cryptocurrency—without risking your savings or sanity? In this playful and completely risk-free course, enter a made-up digital economy where you get to mine coins, buy, sell, trade, speculate, and maybe even hack your way to millions!

Sep 18, 2025: How Does Crypto Work? – Explore the fundamental mathematics and language of cryptocurrency, including encryption, blockchains, and hashing. In an interactive take-home activity, simulate the mining process to add coins to your own digital wallet.

Sep 25, 2025: Playing with Crypto - Apply your new knowledge of basic crypto mechanics—and your own mined coins—inside a simplified version of a digital world. This simulation demystifies how Bitcoin and other digital currencies function behind the scenes.

NOTE: A standard TI-83 or TI-84 graphing calculator is required for both sessions. Limited quantities of loaners are available.

OLLI member Michael McDaniel is a professor emeritus of mathematics at Aquinas College. He earned an MS and PhD in mathematics from George Washington University. Professor McDaniel can converse with humans, but prefers talking with his ferret, Cocoa Bananas.



Race, Religion, and Global Solidarities in Israel and Palestine

Presented by: Roger Baumann, PhD

As movements for racial justice in the United States gain momentum, they are increasingly looking beyond national borders to forge and appeal to global solidarities. But African American Christian communities themselves—rooted in divergent notions of the spiritual and political mantle of "the Black Church"—differ on whether and how to engage in global conflicts. Using four comparative case studies—from African American Christian Zionists who strongly support the state of Israel to Black activists who express solidarity with Palestinians—examine the distinct yet overlapping approaches to American Black Church activism refracted in the global political issue of Israel and Palestine.

Roger Baumann is an assistant professor of sociology and the director of peace and justice studies at Hope College. He received a Master of Theological Studies from Harvard University and a PhD in sociology from Yale University. His new book, Black Visions of the Holy Land, analyzes African American Christian engagement with the global issue of Israel and Palestine.



Exploring Eastown

Presented by: Sr. Mary Aquinas Weber, OP, Mary Alice Williams, and Stephen T. Staggs, PhD



Spanning 70 square blocks north-south from Fulton Street to Franklin Street and east-west from Plymouth Avenue to Fuller Avenue, Eastown began as a streetcar commuter suburb due to its location between downtown Grand Rapids and Reeds Lake. Through conversation, storytelling, and walking the very streets where it all happened, celebrate the history, heart, and transformation of one of Grand Rapids' most vibrant, progressive, and quirky neighborhoods sometimes described as the "Greenwich Village of Grand Rapids."

Oct 2, 2025, AM: Revitalization - In 1973, in the face of neighborhood decline, redlining, and rising crime, Aquinas College rallied Eastown businesses and residents to form the Eastown Community Association (ECA) and steer toward urban renewal. This partnership fostered a grassroots spirit that still fuels the community today. Sit down with Sr. Mary Aquinas Weber, OP, and Mary Alice Williams—two of the ECA's original leaders and fiercest Eastown champions—as they share fifty years of memories, civic pride, and community organization. Then, see how the ECA is actively engaging with community members today.

Oct 2, 2025, PM: A Stroll Through Eastown - Put on your walking shoes for an immersive, 2-mile guided tour through Eastown's storied streets with stops at five key sites: Holmdene Manor, the East Building, the US Post Office on Lake Drive, the former Sigsbee Elementary School, and the Eastown Community Association office. The tour culminates with a good 'ole hotdog at the landmark Yesterdog. Along the way, digitally access historic photos, maps, and documents on your personal device to see how Eastown has evolved from the early 1900s to the present. It's a walk through time—where every sidewalk has a story.

Sr. Mary Aquinas Weber, OP, is the chancellor emerita of Aquinas College, and a living Grand Rapids icon. She joined the Dominican Sisters of Grand Rapids in 1944, and was later elected as the congregation's youngest Prioress. She has spent years as an educator, administrator, community advocate, and public servant becoming a beloved leader across generations of students, Sisters, families, and organizations. Sr. Aquinas helped establish the Emeritus College (now OLLI at Aquinas) in 1975, and later served as its director.

OLLI member Mary Alice Williams is a community activist and former Grand Rapids City Commissioner. While attending Marquette University, she joined Students United for Racial Equality—beginning a lifelong commitment to social justice that included active roles in the ECA and other community-focused non-profit organizations.

Stephen T. Staggs is the executive director of the Eastown Community Association (ECA). He earned a PhD and graduate certificate in ethnohistory from Western Michigan University. Staggs is also an author and independent historian whose research focuses on the interactions between Indigenous, African, and European peoples.

Presented by: Albert Bell, PhD


In October 1955, *The Mickey Mouse Club* premiered on ABC. The main cast members—child stars known as Mouseketeers—had been chosen after a lengthy nationwide search. The show was designed to tie in to the opening of Disneyland in Anaheim, CA, which took place earlier that summer. Hosted by Jimmy Dodd and Roy Williams, the variety show included song and dance numbers, cartoons, and serials such as *Spin and Marty*. Relive the magic as this course details the history of the program as well as the lives of the Mouseketeers—including Bobby Burgess, Annette Funicello, and Darlene Gillespie—during and after the show's original run.

Albert Bell is an author and professor emeritus of history at Hope College. He holds an MA in history from Duke University and a PhD in history from the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill. Professor Bell is a profound scholar of the Ancient Greek and Roman worlds, but he has a strong passion for American cultural history in the 1930s-1950s.

Liberty and Loyalty at the Edge of Revolution

Presented by: Richard Bell, PhD

What happens when personal convictions clash with the tides of history? Uncover the dramatic stories of the celebrated Marquis de Lafayette—a European noble who risked everything for American liberty—and William Franklin, a loyalist who engulfed his family in a bitter battle of blood and belief.

Oct 7, 2025: Lafayette: The Most Dangerous Man of All – Over the last 250 years, Americans have named at least 600 towns, counties, parks, lakes, rivers, and schools for the Marquis de Lafayette, the proud French knight who helped their ancestors break from Britain. However, beyond America, Lafayette's name can be hard to find. That stark contrast in how history has chosen to remember him is the subject of this session. Lafayette spent the vast majority of his political career in Europe, and the struggle to earn a place in that continent's pantheon of heroes was almost the death of him and still remains a work in progress.

Oct 14, 2025: William Franklin: Divided Loyalty - Dissect the complex life of William Franklin, Benjamin Franklin's only surviving son, whose loyalty to the British Crown set him on a collision course with his revolutionary father. As New Jersey's colonial governor, William upheld monarchy while Benjamin championed liberty, creating a poignant familial and political rift. Examine William's imprisonment, exile in England, and tireless advocacy for the Crown, contrasting it with his father's role in shaping a new nation.

Richard Bell is a critically-acclaimed author and award-winning professor of early American history at the University of Maryland, College Park. He received a BA from the University of Cambridge in his native England before earning an MA and PhD in history from Harvard University. Bell serves as a trustee of the Maryland Center for History and Culture.

A Visual History of the Pantlind Hotel

Presented by: Pamela VanderPloeg, MLS, and Lindsay Hovingh

Check in for a two-week stay at one of the most recognizable features of the Grand Rapids skyline. Construction of the Pantlind Hotel began in 1913, and by 1925, it was ranked among the top hotels in the country—wowing guests (and royalty) with its luxurious accommodations, gold-leaf ceilings, and crystal chandeliers. It later became the Amway Grand Plaza, an investment that sparked the city's modern downtown renaissance. This course is your room key to the glamour, grit, and glow-up of a true Grand Rapids icon.

Oct 8, 2025: Booking It - Trace the Pantlind's rich history with vintage photos, postcards, newspaper clippings, stylish advertising prints, and classic restaurant menus. Take in the stunning 1916 Adam-style redesign by Warren & Wetmore—famed architects of Grand Central Station—which established the hotel's signature look and glamorous reputation. Fast-forward to 1981, when a major restoration and rebranding as the Amway Grand Plaza introduced vibrant interior flair and the striking addition of the modern glass tower.

Oct 15, 2025: Checking In - Take a guided tour through the ornate lobby, ballrooms, guest rooms, and hallways of the historic Pantlind Hotel as well as its surrounding river view, streetscape, and connected Exhibitors Building. Along the way, hear behind-the-scenes stories and architectural details that bring the past to life and celebrate the future.

OLLI member **Pamela VanderPloeg** is an award-winning historian and author. A former library administrator, she earned an MLS from Indiana University Bloomington and an MM from Aquinas College. VanderPloeg compiled ten years of research into Grand Rapids Downtown Buildings, a guide to the historic and modern architectural landscape of downtown Grand Rapids.

Lindsay Hovingh is the director of rooms at the Amway Grand Plaza Hotel. She holds a BA in hospitality business from Michigan State University and has spent nearly two decades in the hospitality industry. Hovingh is also a Certified Rooms Division Executive (CRDE), a credential awarded by the American Hotel & Lodging Educational Institute (AHLEI).

Trump and the Courts

Presented by: Jon VanderPloeg, JD, and David Ryden, PhD

Few modern presidencies have tested the boundaries of American governance as forcefully as Donald Trump's. This course offers a timely examination of the high-stakes legal battles redefining questions of authority, accountability, and the durability of democratic guardrails. How might this barrage of courtroom confrontations reshape the balance of power in Washington and beyond?

Oct 20, 2025: The Federal Courts – Attorney Jon VanderPloeg will break down how the federal court system works, its geographical jurisdiction, and the legal mechanisms surrounding nationwide injunctions and enforcement. This session will also analyze recent threats to ignore court rulings and the implications such defiance poses for the rule of law.

Oct 27, 2025: The Challenges - Professor David Ryden will analyze the ever-growing catalogue of constitutional questions raised by the Trump administration's first year blitzkrieg of executive action. Discussion topics will include the president's pardoning power, farreaching executive orders across a range of policy areas (i.e. DEI, immigration enforcement, and trans issues), impoundment of congressionally authorized funds, unilateral presidential levying of tariffs, and institutional fights picked with elite universities, law firms, and "blue" cities—just to name a few.

Nov 3, 2025: The Scorecard - How are President Trump's policy initiatives faring across the federal judiciary, and how are the courts holding up in the face of the onslaught of litigation surrounding them? How might citizens and legal practitioners alike work to restore constitutional norms and practices amongst their steady erosion which has seemingly reached its apotheosis under Trump.

OLLI member **Jon VanderPloeg** is a lawyer with fifty years of appellate practice in the Michigan Court of Appeals, the Michigan Supreme Court, and the Federal 6th Circuit Court of Appeals. He received a JD from Indiana University Bloomington. VanderPloeg currently serves as of counsel at Hilger Hammond, PC.

David Ryden is a professor of political science at Hope College. He earned a BA from Concordia College, a JD from the University of Minnesota Law School, and a PhD from The Catholic University of America. Professor Ryden is the author of numerous books and articles on the Supreme Court, political parties, and constitutionalism, including The U.S. Supreme Court and the Electoral Process.

Perspectives on Just War Theory

Presented by: Fr. Robert Keller, OP, and Roger Durham, PhD

Can war ever be truly just? Can a just war be waged unjustly? These questions lie at the heart of Just War Theory—a framework that has shaped ethical, moral, and political debates about conflict for centuries. From ancient theology to modern geopolitics, this course examines how and why societies justify war, the moral limits of warfare, and whether these ideas still hold power in the 21st century. How enduring is Just War Theory, and what does it offer in today's age of drone strikes, hybrid warfare, and civilian displacement?

Oct 21, 2025: Origins - This session explores the religious and philosophical foundations of Just War Theory, with particular focus on the contributions of St. Augustine and Thomas Aquinas. Examine two key components: *jus ad bellum* (the justification for going to war) and *jus in bello* (the ethical conduct during war). Discussion will include criteria such as just cause, right intention, proportionality, last resort, and legitimate authority.

Oct 28, 2025: When the Guns Fall Silent - What happens after a war ends? This session addresses jus post bellum—the moral and political responsibilities of states and actors after armed conflict. Topics include post-war justice, reconciliation, reconstruction, and how the concept of proportionality plays out beyond the battlefield. Examine the role of international institutions (i.e. United Nations, International Criminal Court, etc.) and peace agreements to see how realistic or idealistic Just War Theory is when it comes to healing divided societies.

Nov 4, 2025: Just War in a Modern World - How do the ideals of Just War Theory stand up in today's complex conflicts? In this final session, analyze current events in places like Gaza and Ukraine—as well as the War on Terror—through the lenses of *jus ad bellum, jus in bello*, and *jus post bellum*. Discuss how war is "sold" to citizens, proxy warfare, and the ethics of intervention. Are democracies, due to their structures and norms, inherently more peaceful? What is the future of armed conflict as democracies fall?

Fr. Robert "Bob" Keller, OP, is a chaplain and adjunct professor of theology at Aquinas College. He has an MA in theology from the Aquinas Institute of Theology and a PhD in sociology of religion from the Graduate Theological Union (Berkeley, CA). Fr. Bob has served as a campus minister for over twenty years.

Roger Durham is the Palmatier Endowed Professor and chair of political science and international studies at Aquinas College. He earned an MA and PhD in political science from the University of Oregon. Professor Durham is a popular panelist, lecturer, and consultant on international law.

1969 was a time of cultural crisis. Between race riots, political assassinations, and the drafting of friends for the Vietnam War, OLLI member Judy Whipps needed to find a way to either change the world, or leave it. Desdemona's Neighbors: The Pioneering Women of Grand Rapids

The Sweet House—the now 160-year-old Italianate mansion on the southwest corner of Fulton Street and Lafayette Avenue—was the home of Grand Rapids Mayor Martin Luther Sweet and his wife Desdemona. It was also the center of the city's social and political life. Take a seat at Desdemona's table alongside five incredible women whose remarkable contributions shaped Grand Rapids history: Lucy Ball (the city's first professionally trained librarian, and youngest daughter of John Ball), Sophie Campau (wife of Grand Rapids founder Louis Campau), Anna Bissell (the first woman CEO in the United States), Hattie Guild Burton (the city's earliest settler), and Lucinda Pike (wife of fur trader and Native American advocate, Abram Pike).

Carol R. Dodge is an author, historian, docent, and founding member of the Sweet House Foundation. A Grand Rapids native, she has been an active member of the Women's City Club for over forty years, once serving as the organization's president.

Economic Headlines, Explained

How much do we actually learn from scrolling chyrons or clickable, attention-grabbing headlines? The national debt, international competition, and battles over the minimum wage are now daily features of our media diet, but despite all the attention, talking-head commentary can inaccurately conflate economic terms or misrepresent their impact on the American people—influencing voting behavior and political attitudes toward complex fiscal policy. Go beyond the headlines to define and discuss the economic terms entering our popular lexicon.

Oct 30, 2025: National Debt - The national debt represents the total amount the federal government owes its creditors. Is it a sign of a looming crisis, or a necessary tool for economic growth? What's the difference between debt and deficit—and who actually holds the debt? Explore how it's financed, what risks it poses, and why politicians can't seem to agree on what to do about it.

Nov 6, 2025: International Competition - What does it mean to say the United States is "falling behind" China or Europe? Is the race for dominance in technology, manufacturing, and energy winnable—or even measurable? This session breaks down the real economics behind geopolitical rivalry.

Nov 13, 2025: Minimum Wage - The federal minimum wage is \$7.25 per hour. Unpack the economic theories, political arguments, and lived realities behind this national policy. How was a federal wage floor first implemented, how does it compare to state and local wages, and what is the data saying about its effect on jobs, inflation, and inequality?

Dave Hebert is a senior research fellow at the American Institute for Economic Research (AIER). He received an MA and PhD in economics from George Mason University. Hebert was formerly a professor at Aquinas College, Troy University, and Ferris State University. He has served as a fellow with the US Senate Committee on the Budget, worked for the US Joint Economic Committee, and had his work published in several popular outlets and journals.

Thou Shalt Not Suffer a Witch to Live: The Salem Witch Trials

Presented by: Jessica Riley, JD

They called it justice, but history calls it a cautionary tale. The witch hysteria of 1692 started in Salem, Massachusetts, and spread quickly to other nearby towns and villages. By its end a year later, over 200 people were accused of witchcraft and twenty were horrifically executed. When fear ruled and reason vanished, neighbors became enemies, and an entire community came undone.

Oct 30, 2025: Fertile for Fear - Colonial life in 17th-century New England was brutal. This session explores how that volatile environment—marked by political instability, social tension, and religious extremism—set the stage for the Salem Witch Trials. When four young girls began to exhibit strange behavior and leveled accusations of witchcraft, their claims ignited a wave of paranoia that quickly engulfed the region, blurred the line between superstition and reality, and plunged a tight-knit Puritan community into chaos.

Nov 6, 2025: Spectral Evidence - As the list of the accused grew, jails overflowed, and ad hoc courtrooms accepted unconventional, and deeply controversial, evidence as proof of guilt. This session explores how the legal process unraveled as public displays of possession by the so-called afflicted girls—screaming, convulsing, and speaking in tongues—lent dramatic weight to the accusations.

Jessica Riley is the president of the Western Michigan Genealogical Society, contributor to the Grand Rapids Historical Society, and helps adoptees identify birth families through DNA testing. She earned a BA in history from St. Norbert College (De Pere, WI) and a JD from Michigan State University. Riley is the owner of a small, fair-trade business.

Cliff Tholen watched in horror as the body of a fellow American soldier killed in action fell from a Chinook recovery chopper during a chaotic extraction in Quang Ngãi province, south of Da Nang. Just one week later, Tholen himself was seriously wounded and evacuated from Vietnam, never expecting to return. But, nearly five decades later, he was invited to take part in a rare joint US-Vietnamese recovery mission, coordinated by the Defense POW/MIA Accounting Agency (DPAA), to locate and repatriate the remains of that fallen soldier. Retrace Tholen's steps through war-torn memories and the modern Vietnamese landscape with his firsthand account of the emotional tolls and diplomatic efforts that continue long after the fighting ends.

Army Sgt. **Cliff Tholen** served as a combat infantry squad leader with the Americal Division's 11th Light Infantry Brigade from October 1968 until he was wounded in March 1969. Sgt. Tholen later earned both a BS and MBA from Wayne State University.

Hot Topics: How Heat and Epigenetics May Be Shaping Your Biological Clock

Presented by: Ilaria Panzeri, PhD

Epigenetics is the science of how our genes are regulated without changing the underlying DNA code—and it plays a crucial role in how we age, how we respond to our environment, and how diseases like cancer develop. Bullfighting in Life and Business

Bullsh*t (BS)—communication delivered without regard for truth or evidence—should be treated with the same skepticism as outright lies, despite people's tendency to judge it more leniently. Research demonstrates that BS can be more persuasive and harmful than direct lies because it creates ambiguity that makes false claims harder to dismiss, produces stronger "sleeper effects" over time, and degrades our collective ability to distinguish meaningful information from nonsense. This course provides practical strategies for recognizing and combating BS, including requesting plain language explanations, probing for specific evidence, and modeling evidence-based reasoning to create environments where substance is valued over empty rhetoric.

John V. Petrocelli is an experimental social psychologist and professor of psychology at Wake Forest University. He earned an MA in community psychology from Slippery Rock University (Pennsylvania) and a PhD in psychology from Indiana University Bloomington. Petrocelli is journal editor and the author of The Life-Changing Science of Detecting Bullsh*t.

PANTLIND SERIES

African Americans in Early Grand Rapids

Presented by: Ruth Van Stee

Positioned between the cultural hubs of Chicago and Detroit, Grand Rapids has built a distinct and powerful Black history of its own. This course highlights the African American families, churches, organizations, and businesses who laid the foundation for Black life in the city—from the earliest residents before the Civil War to the dramatic population growth brought by the Great Migration.

Dec 4, 2025 - By 1900, more than 600 Black residents in Grand Rapids had established a strong, close-knit community anchored by institutions such as the Messiah Baptist Church (founded in 1890), the Grand Rapids Study Club, the Nineteenth Century Club, James Craig's successful barber shop, and a local NAACP chapter chartered in 1919—all serving as platforms for social and political influence in the face of persistent racism.

Dec 11, 2025 – In the 1920s and 1940s, waves of Black migrants from the South brought new energy to Grand Rapids' African American community, even as discriminatory practices continued to limit employment and housing opportunities. This session introduces Dr. Emmett Bolden's groundbreaking 1927 court case that challenged segregation in Michigan, Club Indigo, and key "firsts" in city government and law enforcement.

Ruth Van Stee is an award-winning historian and retired librarian. She is an active presenter and member of the Greater Grand Rapids Women's History Council and the Grand Rapids Historical Society.

Presented by: Eric Simon, PhD



Drawing upon original source materials and photos, this course provides historical and cultural context of Darwin's era, retraces the five-year journey, discusses how Darwin came to his conclusions, and explains his theories in detail.

Eric Simon is a professor of biology at New England College. He received an MA in biology from Wesleyan University and a PhD in biochemistry from Harvard University. An avid traveler and award-winning nature photographer, Professor Simon leads educational trips to destinations around the world.
